How to find us

Road: From the M25 take the A2 turn-off to London and join the A2. Continue forward when the road becomes the A102. Take the turn-off signposted Greenwich (A206). At the roundabout take the first exit to Greenwich. Continue along the A206 for approximately 1 mile. The campus is on your right. Please note, however, traffic is heavy in Greenwich, parking around the university is limited and the regulations are strict, so we advise visitors to use public transport whenever possible.

If driving from the Blackwall Tunnel, exit on to the slip road for the A206 Greenwich.

Train: London Bridge/Cannon Street/Charing Cross to Greenwich station, or to Maze Hill on the same line if travelling from Kent.

Tube: The nearest underground station is North Greenwich on the Jubilee Line. Then take a 188 bus to the campus.

Docklands Light Railway (DLR): Cutty Sark station is close to the campus and is on the line to Lewisham. If travelling from London on the Tube, change for the DLR at Bank or Tower Gateway.
