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WELCOME TO THE LEARNING AND TEACHING FESTIVAL 2024!

Welcome to the Greenwich Business School Learning and Teaching Festival 2024. This year's festival is back on campus as a one-day event. We hope that this will create opportunities for delegates to interact, network and share experiences together.

This year's festival has been organised by SEBE - Scholarship Excellence in Business Education. SEBE is a faculty-wide group with the aim of facilitating the sharing of learning and teaching practices within the faculty and supporting colleagues with an interest in developing their scholarship and practice in business education.

The Greenwich Business School has grown to be bigger and better over the past year, further enriching our diverse community of staff and students. We hope that the celebration of our learning and teaching will therefore be even more encompassing and informative. With the rapid advancement of technology and the ever-changing landscape of knowledge and skills required in the workforce, meta-learning and the development of meta-cognitive skills such as critical thinking, problem-solving, adaptability, and self-directed learning are increasingly important. Meta-learning involves understanding one's own learning process, identifying effective learning strategies, and continuously refining and improving one's learning approach.

By focusing on meta-learning, universities can empower students to become lifelong learners who are equipped to navigate complex challenges, embrace continuous skill development, and thrive in a rapidly changing world. Additionally, meta-learning aligns with broader educational goals such as fostering creativity, resilience, and a growth mindset, making it a relevant and impactful concept in higher education.

We are delighted that Dr Jillian Terry will provide a keynote on the topic of meta-learning which will act as a stimulus for our discussions over the day.



Bio – Dr Jillian Terry is Associate Professor (Education) and Co-Director of LSE100, the sector-leading flagship interdisciplinary course taken by all undergraduate students at the London School of Economics and Political Science. Trained as an International Relations scholar, Jillian’s research foregrounds feminist ethical perspectives on violence and focuses on the role of new technologies in war and surveillance. She also works on scholarship of teaching and learning, with research interests in interdisciplinary education and inclusive pedagogies. First, we'll discuss the role of technology in co-creation, examining how digital tools can both facilitate and hinder collaborative efforts, and sharing best practices for their effective use.</p> <p>Next, we'll delve into the outcomes of co-creation, focusing on how these practices can enhance critical thinking, creativity, and problem-solving skills among students, preparing them for future challenges and lifelong learning.</p> <p>Finally, we'll address the role of institutional policies in promoting co-creation, discussing how higher education leaders can create supportive environments through strategic policies</p>

and expand opportunities for our students. As graduates, our students will step into a world that values creativity and problem-solving, and they will need to demonstrate how they add value to organisations. Graduate outcomes are a key strategic focus for GBS, and this discussion will spark ideas and provide actionable strategies to incorporate into your teaching. Using a roundtable format, we can share best practice, challenges and explore ideas”		and administrative support. Keynote title: Interdisciplinarity in Meta-Learning



Dr Jillian Terry, London School of Economics

"I am an interdisciplinary social scientist and award-winning educator, with an enthusiasm for interdisciplinary education and innovative pedagogies to engage students in tackling complex challenges.

I am lucky to work with an incredibly talented team of academics and education professionals to lead LSE100, LSE's sector-leading flagship interdisciplinary course which is taken by over 1800 first-year undergraduate students each year. My research primarily focuses on the scholarship of teaching and learning, with current projects investigating the value of interdisciplinary education in responding to the world's most pressing issues, teaching climate optimism, and approaches to interdisciplinary group work.

With academic training in Political Science and International Relations, my disciplinary research interests lie at the intersection of ethics, technology, and critical feminist approaches, and I am currently interested in questions of surveillance, emerging technologies, and the ethics of AI in warfare."
