## What is PULSE?

- <u>PULSE</u> is the digital environment used by Greenwich to support PGRs, supervisory teams and researcher development activities.
- It is an online system designed to give you all the information you need in one place, enabling streamlining of administrative processes, giving you greater access to key progression and training information, and providing a simple booking platform for researcher development opportunities.

### What does PULSE do?

#### **PULSE** enables you to:

- Access information relating to your record with the university
- View your key academic milestones
- Record supervisory meetings and points of contact
- Complete and submit forms designed to enable progression (formerly Research Degree Administration forms)
- Complete a Development Needs Analysis (DNA) linked to the Vitae Researcher Development Framework (RDF)
- View and book Researcher Development activities and events
- View and maintain a record of your training and development activities
